SECRETARY'S REPORT FOR THE AGM ON SATURDAY 28 SEPTEMBER 2024

This year has seen the marking of the centenary of the Society's foundation in 1924. The annual Society dinner, which was formerly held in London, is now established as a College-based event and took place on Saturday 11 May. The benefit of holding the dinner in Cambridge, in addition to the cost saving for guests compared with London prices, was being able to stage a small symposium entitled 'Postcards from 1924' in the College Auditorium. Our speakers were Fitzwilliam Fellows Prof Kasia Boddy (English), Dr Jean-Michel Johnston (History), Prof Matthew Wingate (Physics), and alumnus Prof Mark Blagrove (NatSci 1979). The event was chaired by Society President, Dr Paul Chirico. Pre-dinner drinks in the Auditorium Foyer were enhanced by the accompaniment of a jazz trio, led by student, Louis Henry, and the chance to see an exhibition on the history of the Society produced by Dr John Cleaver. Dinner was held in the main hall, and the menu took inspiration from the founding 1924 dinner. 161 alumni, Fellows and their guests attended.

Alumni had the opportunity to congregate on several other occasions during the year. In September 2023 more than 200 former students and their guests attended Reunions for matriculation years up to 1963, and 1983, 1993, 2003 and 2013. A further 219 guests came to the triennial Golden Matriculation Reunion for years 1973, 1974 and 1975 this July. Sporting events included the Fairbairns Dinner organised by the Billygoats, and the Sports Dinner. There were subject events this year for Medics and Vets in February, and Law and MML in March. The MML Dinner (137 attendees) was preceded by a memorial service in the College Chapel for Dr Geoff Walker, a Fitzwilliam alumnus and Fellow, and leading member of the College and University MML community. Honorary Fellow Lady Justice Asplin (Law 1979) gave a talk at the Law Reception in London (117 attendees). In addition, alumni events in College included the 30th Anniversary Commemoration of the Chapel, delayed from 2021 (78 attendees) and the annual 1869 Foundation & Master's Circle Lunch in June. More than 100 alumni attended the Society's London Drinks held in February at the George and Monkey pub in Clerkenwell.

Further afield, the Master, Bursar and Development Director held a high profile reception at the old Parliament Building in Singapore in January, to commemorate the centenary of the birth of former student and Honorary Fellow, Lee Kuan Yew. This was attended by Singapore's Prime Minister, Lee Hsien Loong (son of LKY). The PM, Master and two Fitzwilliam Scholars addressed an audience of more than 100 guests. Gabriel Fong (Economics 1989) and his wife Vena hosted an event in Hong Kong (55 attendees). A Fitzwilliam alumni evening in New York was attended by the Master and Development Director in October.

The scheduling of the Reunion Dinners continues in the 2 dinner pattern. The first dinner took place yesterday (with booking priority for 2004 and 2014 matriculants), and the second

is this evening, with priority for matriculants from pre 1964, 1984 and 1994. There is a strong turnout.

Your committee has as usual met twice in the last year. The May meeting was held in College, before the Centenary Dinner, and was again arranged as a hybrid meeting to enable some committee members to attend remotely. The second meeting took place on 19 September, and was held remotely on *Teams*.

The Grants sub-committee, chaired by Rachael Webb, received 11 applications for grants to support student activities and projects under the programme which started in the academic year 2014-15. This sub-committee liaises with the MCR and JCR Presidents in the Michaelmas term to discuss the process, timetable and criteria for applications for grants. The sub-committee benefits from the advice of the Senior Tutor and Tutorial Committee to ensure that applications do not overlap with other sources of potential funding (e.g. the JMA) and are feasible projects. This year the maximum sum available was again £3,000. In total £2,432 was awarded to the 8 successful applicants. A wide range of projects were supported: Artistic Endeavours, Black Girls' Blues, Fitz Pump Society, Fitz Green Society, Ents Committee, Fitzwilliam Jewish Society, Land Economy Society, and the updating of the MCR Presidents' board. Particular thanks are due to Rachael for her hard work in driving this programme and providing feedback to the applicants.

The Trust sub-committee, formed to liaise with the College about the annual programme of awards from the Fitzwilliam Society Trust Fund, did not meet this year. The College administers this in accordance with details agreed with the Society in 2007, when the charitable company which had previously made the awards passed to the College the custody and management of the trust fund and the administration of the awards. The trust fund was built up over many years from donations, and its income is used to make the awards. They include academic scholarships and prizes, a grant to the library, prizes for debating and grants for music and arts projects. The role of the sub-committee is to consider, and if thought fit to approve, any changes to the awards programme proposed by the College. A detailed report on the Trust Fund awards for 2023-24 has been provided separately.

Thanks are due to many people for their support of the Society during the year, including Baroness Sally Morgan, the Master, Dr Nicola Jones, the Director of Communications and Engagement, Peter O'Connor, the Development Director, Dr Miles Stopher, Acting Senior Tutor and Rod Cantrill, the Bursar, together with their respective teams. And finally, we must thank our President, Dr Paul Chirico, for chairing committee meetings and hosting the Centenary event in May. He has just resumed his 'day job' as Senior Tutor.

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NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS:

- 1. The subscriptions shown above are those received in the period from members currently at the College.

 Subscription levels were reviewed in 2014-15, with all students (JCR and MCR) now paying on an equivalent basis.
- 2. Donations received from members of the Society towards the costs of printing and postage of the Journal.
- 4. The Society and the College share the cost of printing/distributing the Fitzwilliam Journal to those members of the College who are members of the Society. The figure has been revised this year to include £2,000 for printing and postage and £7,500 towards the Editor's costs, the balance being met by the College.
- 6. For Time, National Geographical, and the New Scientist in the Student Café.
- 7. The Society made nine grants (total £2,796 last year £2,670) to the MCR and JCR.
- 8. The Society funded the provision of the Trio Band at the 100th Anniversary Dinner on 11 May 2024
- 9. The Society's assets are on loan interest-free to Fitzwilliam College, to the benefit of the Society's Trust fund at the College. The fund supports the College by awarding scholarships and prizes, funding research awards and the Milner Walton Music & Drama Awards, and an annual library grant.
- 10. The surplus of £3,004 remains quite high, although the Society's share of Journal costs has increased by £1,000 from £8,500 to £9,500 or 12% following this year's review.

Hon Treasurer's Report on the accounts for the year to 31 July 2024

The Society's surplus of £3,004 shows a year-on-year reduction of £1,184 compared with the previous year's surplus of £4,187.

A dinner was held in college on Saturday 11th May 2024 to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the Society's foundation in 1924. The dinner was a memorable success and was well attended. The Society paid for the Trio Band at the dinner but, as attendees funded the dinner, no other costs were incurred.

The 2023 Journal was produced. Following the rationalisation of student subscriptions in 2014/15, subscription income has reduced and since that time the Society has met a reducing proportion of Journal costs. The Society met a total of £9,500 (£8,500 in 2023). A proportion of the Editor's costs is met by the Society (£7,500) while the College meets the balance of her costs. £2,000 is contributed towards printing, postage and other costs.

The Society provided student grants for nine projects totalling £2,796 (£2,670 in 2022). The grants sub-committee selected the projects from a total of eleven submitted by the JCR and MCR and were very much assisted in their task by the Senior Tutor. The "Student Grants for Projects" cycle and guidance are now well-established. Its operation is under review for future years.

The net assets of the Society were £58,327 (£55,324 in July 2023). These are lent interest-free to the College to the benefit of the Fitzwilliam Society Trust Fund, income from which supports a range of student and research activities.

I should like to thank the Honorary Independent Examiner, Roger Smith, for his work.


